Love Grows in Frail Flesh - a word from our minister.

'Don't be afraid, Mary,' the angel told her. 'You have found favour with God! You will conceive and give birth to a son, and you will name him Jesus. He will be very great and will be called the Son of the Most High. The Lord God will give

him the throne of his ancestor David. And he will reign over Israel forever; his Kingdom will never end!" (Luke 1:30-33)

The birth of Jesus - God with us - is an amazing miracle. Only God could have devised such a plan to take on human flesh and be born, through water and blood, in an animals' shelter. Anyone who has ever been present at the birth of child knows that something supernatural is going on. How is it possible? That this fragile bundle of human flesh, with perfectly formed limbs and unique fingerprints, can emerge from within the womb of a mother?

Mary was likely only a teenage girl when the angel visited her, but from that moment on, the love of God was growing inside her. God had 'taken notice of this lowly servant girl' (Luke 1:48) and she knew that from now on she would be blessed. She needn't be afraid. Nothing was impossible for the God who had spoken to her. As we prepare to celebrate another Christmas, may you know, that because of the incarnation of God with us, the love of God is growing inside you too. And despite your hesitations and doubts, the God who is with us, is determined to bring his gift to fulfilment, so that you might experience grace upon grace, and live and love, out of the overflow of his mercy.

Like Mary, may your soul praise the Lord, and your spirit rejoice in God the Saviour.

PRESBYTERY NEWS The Presbytery of West Lothian will cease to exist on 31st December 2021. The final two meetings will be in-person at Bathgate High and Broxburn.Resignations have been accepted from the Presbytery Clerk and the Depute Clerk and Treasurer
the current paid posts in the Presbytery of Edinburgh of Presbytery Clerk, Depute Clerk, Administrator, Treasurer, and the four Presbytery Chaplains, will continue in the new 'Presbytery of Edinburgh and West Lothian', with the current post-holders remaining.
There are seismic changes required in the Church and it is unclear where we will be in a few years. Online must be in the mix for the future. And what about Calderwood?
There are concerns regarding keeping <i>all</i> the buildings (in the presbytery area): there are too many; they are not currently being utilised well; and perhaps they are in the wrong place. Closing buildings is likely to cause upset but retaining them all (and bringing them up to modern standards) would cost a great deal.
Congregations with natural convection or fan-assisted radiators have been advised to switch these on before people are in the building and then switch them off when people are in the building. The large hall at Kirknewton is affected.

EAST CALDER HALL(S): LETS

Hall users are slowly returning to our buildings and bringing life back into the premises with a mixture of Church and Community groups, together with some one-off children's parties,

So far, we have:

Church Groups: The Boys Brigade, The Guild, Men's Fellowship and EnerJ.

Community Groups: Zumba with Lindsay; *Step into Dance*; Boogey Bounce; various dance lessons; and Parents and Toddlers.

Other groups are waiting until they are ready to return.

Due to unprecedented times, it was decided that responsibilities for using the Church premises must be documented. All groups must clean the touch points, before and after use, remove all rubbish into outside bins, basically leave the premises as they are found. For *Test and Protect* purposes, each group must keep a record of everyone attending and all must adhere to Covid guidelines to keep ourselves and others safe.

Our retiring chief officer and his wfe were our guests and presented the badges. Their work and commitment to the 1st East Calder were acknowledged and they were presented with a BB clock.

After a few weeks of sessions outdoors in September, we returned to the Church Hall. Although it is a little different to our normal indoor sessions, it is great to be back.

At this year's Enrolment Service (Friday 8th October in East Calder Church), there was a great 'buzz' with over a hundred people, and about 90% of the boys, attending.

Our Friday evenings continue to be busy, with activities, sports, crafts, and bible classes. The Company Section had two special visitors on the same evening: one who led the boys in a bible class about Joseph, linking it to a trip to Rwanda; and one who gave the boys a taste of his life as a professional darts player. He had been a BB boy with us. We wished him all the best on the European darts tour.

Five Company Section boys took part in the Remembrance Service in Kirknewton Church before marching to the Memorial, where one boy read 'In Flanders Fields' (by John McCrae) and another laid the wreath. 'Well done' to the boys who took part

We are holding our Christmas service on Friday the 17^{th of} December in East Calder Church at 7pm. it would be great to see you there!

As we finish up for Christmas, we can take great encouragement into the New Year. We finished the last BB year with twenty boys. This year, by the end of November, we had thirty-eight. In this difficult time for youth organisations around the country, we rejoice that our future looks bright.

It is a great privilege to be appointed as the coordinator of the Community Listening project. We currently have ten listeners who will form the team.

We hope to sign up two or three people for the Advanced Listening course which runs January to March. This will allow us to do more formal listening by referral and appointment. In the meantime, we plan to set up an informal 'listening café', where

people can drop in for a cup of tea and chat or play a game. This will start off in the Church Hall at East Calder in January with a view to moving to different locations as we discover what works for people. We have a year to pilot this project with a report due in November 2022. There will be a lot of trial and error and we would appreciate your prayers. We have been working on getting people through the safeguarding training and progressing disclosures.

We will be setting up a Facebook page and circulating posters to alert people within the community to the project. This is an exciting time and, mid pandemic, there is a real need to be there for and listening to the needs of our neighbours. More details will follow as time progresses.

MEN'S FELLOWSHIP

We have been blessed in managing to keep a full programme going through this difficult Covid period, thanks in the main to Zoom communication. Not my favourite! But it really has kept our fellowship alive at such a difficult time.

It has meant that we could have speakers who live a considerable distance away and would not normally travel to be with us. Our speakers ranged widely, e.g.
