#### from our minister.... EASTER'S SAVING LOVE

In 1982, an aeroplane took off from Washington, DC and crashed into the Potomac River. It was winter and the river was full of ice. Soon the world's media gathered, and TV cameras rolled. Millions of viewers watched as a helicopter let down a lifebelt on a line to a man struggling in the water. He grabbed the line, swam to another survivor, and clipped the woman in. She was hoisted up to safety. The helicopter let the line down again, and the man swam to someone else and rescued them. He saved five people before finally, exhausted, he himself drowned.

Why did this man not save himself? Like Jesus, he was only out to save others. Because of what Jesus brought into effect at Easter, we can now live with his resurrection power at work in our lives, the very lives God meant us to live. His overwhelming love can flow through us in every moment, every place, as we journey on. The Spirit that raised Christ is the same Spirit that lives in the world and brings new life. The same saving love and power is there to be discovered and shared today, wherever and whoever we are. Why not take a moment to breathe in that love afresh, hold it and receive it; then ask the Lord to show you how, when, and where to breathe it out?

#### PRAYER MATTERS



In you, O Lord, I take refuge

## ALL START AT 7.00PM

Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday (3<sup>rd</sup>/ 4<sup>th</sup>/ 5<sup>th</sup> April) in East Calder

A time to reflect, pray, listen, sing, and draw close to Jesus in this, the hardest week of his earthly life.

Thursday, in Kirknewton Church, we will remember how he washed his disciples' feet and broke bread with them, sharing their Passover meal - then turning it into the wonderful Sacrament of Communion. We will share in that meal and that sacrament as we celebrate Communion with Alistair, our minister.' For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you. '(John 13:11)

Friday – *Good Friday* - in East Calder Church, Alistair will lead us in a time of reflection on and appreciation of what Jesus accomplished on this day of days.

'He was wounded for our transgressions, crushed for our iniquities; upon him was the punishment that made us whole, and by his bruises we are healed.' (Isaiah 53:5)

#### How to Win by Losing

Whoever wishes to come after me must deny themselves, take up their cross, and follow me. For whoever wishes to save their life will lose it, but whoever loses their life for my sake and that of the gospel will save it. (Mark 8:34–35)

Christians too often preach a self-absorbed gospel of religiosity, rather than a 'lifestyle gospel.' The gospel is so radical that if we truly believed its message, everything we think and do would be called into question. Did we totally miss the point when we made a religion out of Jesus, instead of realising he was giving us a message of simple humanity, vulnerability, and nonviolence, necessary for the reform of *all* religions? Should we be more concerned with *following* Jesus and less with worshipping Him?



If we dedicate our lives to building bridges (the 'ministry of reconciliation') the price is that we will be - like all bridges - walked on from both sides. Reconcilers are normally hated by all because they are neither on one side nor the other. They build the vulnerable bridge between the sides; but this can look like conceding ground to the foe. Jesus is

both person and process, the Son of God and 'The Way', the goal and the means. However, we would like the person of Jesus but not his process or path, the cross as a 'heavenly transaction' but not as a pattern for our lives. To the world, the way of the cross looks like failure. But Christianity is about how to win by losing!
