THE COST-OF-LIVING CRISIS

A recent report by Professor Donald Hirsch of Loughborough University says the support being offered to low-income families will fall at least £1,600 short of making up for recent changes to living costs, plunging many families into poverty and debt.

The report has been commissioned by Gordon Brown. He says: "This is a crisis that Britain hasn't seen in decades. It goes far beyond politics. The new Prime Minister has a moral responsibility to ensure that everyone has enough to live on, through this crisis and beyond.'

The Church of Scotland has joined 56 faith groups, charities and politicians urgently calling on the Government to bridge this gap. The four main blows hitting millions of low-income families:

- cuts in Universal Credit
- inadequate uprating of benefits
- accelerating inflation
- the rise in the energy cap

WHAT CAN KNEC DO TO HELP THIS WINTER?

THE ENING PROPIE

THE WARM HUB

WHY: The soaring costs of electricity and the cost-of-living crisis will see some of our community in cold homes this winter, possibly hungry or even homeless. Going cold and

hungry is something no one should have to suffer.

WHAT: Our WARM HUB, in the downstairs church hall in East Calder, will aim to provide a space for people to come and sit in the warm. There will be a free bowl of soup, warm drinks, and biscuits; also, free WI-FI, which will allow people to sit in a corner and work if they need to. This will also help people who are isolated and lonely. Hubs will run on Mondays and Wednesdays from 11am – 3pm. They will be free, with a donation box available.

HOW: Possibly partnering with Mabitts Coffee Shop to make the soup for a fair price. Two volunteers and the Project Co-ordinator to be present at every Hub. Volunteer slots split in two, so four volunteers for each Hub.

VOLUNTEERS: will undergo a short training course to equip them with the do's and don'ts of the project, its aims and values; plus food hygiene and safeguarding training for some. All will sign a confidentiality statement and, for volunteers not already known to us, a character reference will be required.

FAMILIES will be welcome with some toys available for children. Parents to stay with their children and take responsibility for their safety, especially when hot soups/drinks are around. We will be happy to talk to and play with children, generally making them and their parents feel as comfortable as possible.

BLANKETS: anyone can take one to help keep warmer on cold nights.

FORMAL ONE-TO-ONE LISTENING: sessions to be available if/when needed, either during the Hub or arranged at another time.

Please pray for me as I co-ordinate and develop the project. Pray for good vision, an open heart, and the skills needed to serve the community in whatever ways God has planned.

New Session Clerk

A Unitary Constitution?

THE FUTURE OF OUR BUILDINGS

- By the end of 2022 there needs to be a Presbytery Plan in place
- We cannot justify keeping all three buildings in the future
- We must dispose of one or more
- A *feasibility study* to be commissioned by the Board
- We want to keep a physical presence in each of our villages

EAST CALDER IDEAS

- priority is disabled access for both hall and church
- convert church into a multi-function venue (remove pews)

KIRKNEWTON IDEAS

- priority to improve disabled access
- replace the kitchen and toilets or
- demolish them and form a new entrance to church and hall incorporating new toilets, kitchen and disabled access
- remove 25% of pews (those rarely used)
- remove pulpit and all pews to form a multi-function space.

OTHER IDEAS

- dispose of all buildings and use public spaces (village halls, etc)
- build a new worship centre.
- dispose of East Calder halls and develop both churches
- close Kirknewton make East Calder the congregational hub
- close both churches and develop East Calder Hall
- pool resources with surrounding churches

Significant issues need to be addressed before our buildings can be classed as "well equipped and in the right place" (as in the *Presbytery Plan*). The feasibility study will help us decide the way forward.

Our registration/information evening gave parents a chance to register their son with us; or to meet us and get some further information.



Our first official night back was on the 26th of August. We were delighted to have 40 boys -6 more than last year. With a few regulars from last term returning, too, it looks like we are in for a busy year!
