

COVER PICTURE: LIGHT & CANDLE FOR UKRAINE Sunday 27th February, a short service, an opportunity for church and community to reflect, pray, and light a candle.

A local Ukrainian family joined us. They are part of our church family, and we hold them close in prayer while their own family are all in Ukraine. They shared with us about the terrifying scenes and great fear there. They have had contact with their family, and we pray this can continue. We lit candles and prayed God's light to shine into the darkness of this war. We read Isaiah 54 :10, 'Though the mountains be shaken, and the hills be removed, yet my unfailing love for you will not be shaken nor my covenant of peace be removed'. Ukraine is feeling the ground shake. They need God's covenant of peace now, more than ever.

We sang "Amazing Grace', then listened to it sung in Ukrainian. It was a very special and moving service.

Please keep this family in your prayers, along with the many other Ukrainian families living so far from home. The mum drew the cover picture: praying hands over her motherland.

And from a Christian Russian professor ...

'Russia must suffer a terrible punishment for this unjust war, for the blood and suffering. All of us Russians are guilty of allowing the dictator to engage in robbery and violence for twenty-two years. I'm ashamed that I have a Russian passport that has the colour of blood and gore. Military censorship has been introduced in Russia. People who criticize the president's actions, and are against the war, are regarded as criminals. I cannot write a long letter. The situation is very bad here.'

There are no winners in this war. Pray for peace. Our God is able.

MESSAGE FROM OUR MINISTER

Then Jesus came to them and said, 'All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Therefore, go and make disciples of all nations, baptising them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely, I am with you always, to the very end of the age'. (Matthew 28:18-20)

Jesus was sent into the world on a mission, so that *all who would believe would not perish but have eternal life* (John 3:16). The mission of the Church is this mission of Christ. You and I, as members of the Church, must naturally be involved. But how? On page 7, you will read about 'Five Marks of Mission'. If we concur, all five will be seen in our witness together:

- proclaim the Good News of the Kingdom.
- teach, baptise and nurture new believers.
- respond to human need by loving service
- try to transform unjust structures, challenge violence, and pursue peace and reconciliation
- strive to safeguard the integrity of creation and sustain and renew the life of the Earth

You may think one mark more important than another, but most of us will probably agree they all matter. I wonder how you would score *our* Church against each mark. I can think of at least one example of our engagement in each of the marks.

We are all watching the horrendous unfolding of events in Ukraine. People in all walks of life look to see how the Church is responding. Gathering to pray for the people of Ukraine and Russia is an important mark. And, as we approach Lent and Easter once more, let us together proclaim the Good News of the Kingdom (the first mark). Whenever we can, let us pray/act *together*, in accordance with these marks. Grace and peace everyone.

THE PRESBYTERIES MISSION PLAN (decided in General Assemblies 2019 and 2021)

<u>Aims:</u>

- to ensure the Church uses its finite resources effectively
- to ensure it is properly equipped
- to deliver the Good News in a dynamic, sustainable way
- to embrace innovative, imaginative ways to do this

<u>Plans:</u>

- presbyteries to be reduced from 43 to 12
- ministry posts to be reduced by 40% to 600 (FTE)
- buildings to be 'appropriate spaces and places'
- the number to be reduced where there are too many
- a place of worship to be retained in each community

Implications for us:

- In W. Lothian, single congregations will be the exception
- Edinburgh and W. Lothian Presbyteries to unite (as from 1st January 2022)

The Assembly encourages us to pursue '*Five Marks of Mission*' (Alistair refers to them in his letter on page 4). These are:

- proclaim the Good News of the Kingdom.
- teach, baptise and nurture new believers.
- respond to human need by loving service
- try to transform unjust structures, challenge violence, and pursue peace and reconciliation
- strive to safeguard the integrity of creation and sustain and renew the life of the Earth

KNEC forms part of **Mission District 3**, within which:

- Kirk of Calder /Livingston Old /Livingston United form a 'Parish Grouping'
- Polbeth/West Calder and KNEC remain unchanged
- the West Lothian/Edinburgh border (KNEC/Ratho) may see further change in the future

District 3 wants local worship communities to be preserved. The talents and gifts of all congregation members will therefore be needed, and there will be training in how to:

- lead worship
- cover school chaplaincy
- perform funerals and other minister duties

Way forward for KNEC

- Meet with Mission District 3 churches to clarify our role
- Consider links with other congregations on the West Lothian/Edinburgh border
- Consider the location and use of our buildings
- Agree KNEC's vision and the most appropriate way to embrace the 'Five Marks of Mission'

KNEC congregational online consultation on 8th March (Zoom)

Thereafter the Session will prepare its vision and plans
